Re: Support for LB 701 to eliminate a termination date for vocational training opportunities in the ADC program

Voices for Children supports LB 701 because it supports education as a pathway out of poverty by eliminating the termination date on provisions that allow ADC participants to enter into vocational training while still meeting program requirements.

Education has increasingly become inseparable from financial hardship for families in our state and across the nation. In 2014, the median income of those with some college or an associate's degree was \$3,695 higher than that of high school graduates.<sup>1</sup> ADC is intended to support very low income families with children, and payments are often the only form of income for participating families. LB 701 would further ensure that families receiving ADC payments are able to seek economic mobility and improved stability.

According to the National Center for Children in Poverty, in 2013 61% (38,726) of Nebraska children whose parents have a high school degree lived in low-income families.<sup>2</sup> Keeping this provision in our ADC program supports parents who are taking steps to increase their financial stability by allowing them to pursue opportunities that can increase their earning potential. Furthermore, reducing barriers to self-sufficiency for families is a potential cost-savings for the state. Our state should continue to ensure that all of our public systems are effective, and LB 701 marks progress in ensuring that we maximize opportunities that promote long-term stability for many families and children in our state.

We urge the committee to advance this bill and thank Senator Mello for bringing this issue forward. Thank you.
