In 2023, Voices for Children published a milestone 30th edition of the Kids Count in Nebraska Report. This publication serves as a trusted resource for Nebraska lawmakers, researchers, service providers, educators, and community leaders, providing pertinent information on the well-being of all Nebraska children in the areas of health, child welfare, education, economic stability, and juvenile justice.

## Sharing Data; Impacting Communities

Voices for Children in Nebraska is proud to provide reliable, relevant, and up-to-date data on child well-being in our state each year. In addition to gathering, aggregating, and publishing the data, we work hard to share it both locally and nationally. In 2023, we distributed over 1,000 free copies of the report, and our research coordinator gave several presentations to organizations and groups across Nebraska.



# Pro-Kid Policy Plan

Children are our state's greatest resource, and the decisions our leaders make about them impact our collective future.

Voices for Children has developed a Pro-Kid Policy Plan, focusing on the issues of **child welfare**, **economic stability**, **health**, and **juvenile justice**. Our policy priorities are guided by research, data, and proven best practices that improve child well-being. We pay close attention to the impact of race, socioeconomic status, and geography, and seek to remove barriers to opportunity within these areas.



## **CHILD WELFARE**

Children grow up in safe, permanent, and loving homes. An effective child welfare system strengthens families and minimizes trauma through timely and appropriate action.



## **ECONOMIC STABILITY**

Families are able to achieve financial security, and children's basic needs are met. State economic policies support families in trying to build a better future and balance work and family life.



## HEALTH

Children and families have access to affordable, quality physical and behavioral health care. Consistent and preventive health care gives children the best start to grow up to be healthy and productive adults.



## **JUVENILE JUSTICE**

Youth are held accountable for their actions in developmentally appropriate ways that promote community safety and allow them to grow into responsible citizens.

# **Positive** Noise at the **Capitol**

The small and mighty Voices for Children team weighed in on a whopping 57 bills and one legislative resolution in 2023. In the end, 10 of our topline priority bills for kids became law, and we successfully opposed three harmful bills — making the 108th Nebraska legislative session successful by providing tangible benefits to thousands of children and youth across our state.

## Health

Voices for Children fought to maximize School District Uptake of the Community Eligibility Provision so that children in our lowest-income neighborhoods are guaranteed nutritious meals at school without red tape getting in the way.



## **Economic Stability**

In 2023, Voices for Children retained our current eligibility level for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and the childcare subsidy so that families relying on these crucial supports won't lose access to them.



## Juvenile Justice

We opened our extended foster care program, Bridge to Independence, to young people aging out of the juvenile justice system at risk of homelessness. This allows them to safely transition from system involvement to adulthood.



## Youth Voice

Two youth lobby days were hosted by Voices for Children in 2023, bringing middle and high school students to the Capitol to participate in the action and make their voices heard with state legislators.




#### Revenue
