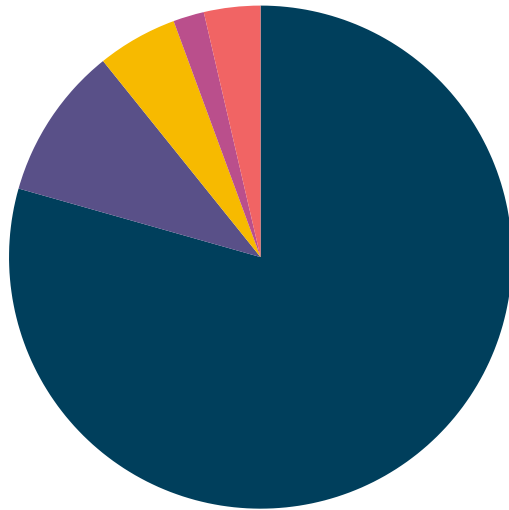

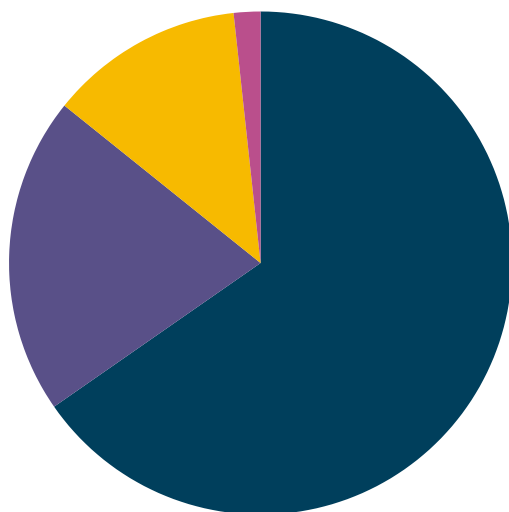


## Revenue
